THE PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

"Look at all the work we've done, everybody showin' up!" This is the first line of one of my favorite choir songs. We've really lived it this Fall! As we go into another calendar year, we can be proud of ourselves.

We have had lots of "regular" activities with sermon discussion groups, book groups, another successful auction, and other groups that usually meet on a regular basis. Of course, Sunday mornings is our favorite activity.

In addition, Rev. Sian taught a class on the historical Jesus, we welcomed six new members (get to know Jennifer, Pat, Emily, Phyllis, Karen, and Glenn!), 36 people attended our weekend camp at deBenneville, 47 Ukrainians have been living at some point in our two-story building, a Town Hall meeting for sanctuary updates, and there was a national election.

I'm afraid I can't report we quite made it to the published standards for a "Good Trouble Congregation". We were so close. When I was asking people to report their efforts and said, "We just need 400 more letters or postcards!", I was accused of sounding like our former president. I like to think we made it.

Collectively, we sent 2,430 postcards or letters, 2,000 text messages, made 4,020 phone calls, 455 door knocks, registered 5,000 new voters, and three of us worked at the polls. Seventeen people reported, and I do believe there were more of us. That's fantastic! Given the unpredicted outcome, I say we made a difference!

We are an awesome congregation, and I am excited about what 2023 may bring. The last line of the song is "And we gotta keep walkin' it"!

UPDATE ON BOARD GOALS

It is halfway through our church year, and we think we have finally settled on Board Goals. Some of them took some time to determine what was possible, and the release of the draft of a new Article 2 of the UUA Bylaws created a question whether to focus on the proposed 8th Principle as an amendment to the existing Article 2 or the newly proposed rewrite of Article 2. WHICH ONE OR BOTH?

Although some say we should work on both projects, we decided to focus our efforts on Article 2 for these reasons:

- 1. Both amendments address the same thing:
 - a. Specifically incorporating anti-racism and support for all people
 - b. Holding ourselves accountable for all the work we do to further our mission.
- 2. Article 2 is more elegantly worded and incorporates the entire UUA mission, work, and covenant.
- 3. Article 2 is more likely to pass, eliminating the need for the Eighth Principle.
- 4. Working on both would be confusing!

Here are the updated Board Goals for 22-23:

- More Visibility in Community:
 Unified signage on the street.
- Centering Families: Increase the visibility of families in the service with specific roles. Make childcare possibilities for events easier to access.
- New Sanctuary: The congregation is well informed and supportive about the sanctuary throughout the process. A plan is in place for making resources available as needed.
- Bring Article 2 to Congregation: By the Annual Meeting, the delegates are prepared and informed of the congregation opinions on Article 2.

There have been adequate opportunities for discussion and learning about Article 2. We will use Article 2 as an impetus for our conversation on anti-racism and anti-oppression.

Some of these are already in process, such as our Christmas Eve signs. Please talk to any Board Member if you have questions or would like to help.

If you are a Zoomer and unable to attend in person, please let us know and we'll arrange to have you attend virtually.


FORMING FAITH

Stitchwits meet on Zoom every Saturday from 10:30am to 12:30pm and are knitting, crocheting, or sewing items for Stand Up for Kids.




