On February 21, 2021 at a special congregational meeting, the OCUUC members present and voting overwhelming approved the motion to move forward with the proposed design and funding plans for the new sanctuary building. Hurray for all of us! This is a momentous step in the history of our congregation and one for which many people have carefully and diligently worked to reach this point and outline the path forward.

So many people have given generously of their time, talent and treasure over the last three years to bring the new sanctuary project where it is today. A very special thanks to all of our generous Donors to the sanctuary pledge drive. They truly made it happen!

Special thanks to Linda Spery, for her expertise and leadership of the Sanctuary Design Committee and then the Sanctuary Pledge Drive Committee. Craig Spery has been instrumental in this work as well especially on the Sanctuary Design Committee and leading the interactions with the architects interviewed and the architect chosen.

Special thanks also to Property Use Group Co-Chairs, Nancy and Tom Loughrey, the Board of Trustees, Reverend Sian Wiltshire for her constant positivity and inspiration, and past president Don Martin who worked to start the ball rolling on building a new sanctuary. And many thanks to all those who have served on the committees named above.

The refurbishment of the RE/Administration building lobby, conference room, hallways, bathrooms, and a new storage room has been completed. Many thanks to B&G Chair Audrey Prosser and B&G members and volunteers Craig Spery, Bob Loeschen, Cory Brown, Bob Gurski, Tom Loughrey and Anna Ryan for the many hours of planning and work put into this major renovation. Next month we will publish pictures of the refurbished space once it has been completely cleaned and the furnishings put back in place. Audrey and I were in the RE/Administration building again today and it looks so fresh, bright and spacious.

On February 20, 2021 the entire Board of Directors attended an all-day Board Development Training program presented by the staff of the Pacific Western Region. We interacted with board members from eight other UU congregations from California, Montana, Colorado and Alaska. I have heard back from our board members that it was a day well spent and we will implement several of the tools presented.

Religious Education News from RE Minister Rev. Judy Tomlinson

To what and to whom are you committed?

This month we focus our attention on Commitment. I suppose if we put this in children's language we would ask, "What promises do you make?"

For me commitment is firmly linked with responsibility. I seem to have had a heavy dose of that in my life from an early age. Mostly, it has served me well, though stress is often responsibility's close companion.

Soul Matters, a UU religious professionals consortium, is the source of our Religious Education/Exploration lessons for children and youth. Each month we explore a new theme and March is dedicated to Commitment. We have four Sundays to do a

deep dive. They take us to curiosity, change, conscience, and compassion.

Curiosity is the first. The commitment to asking questions. I've never thought about commitment that way. What a great practice! Francis David, our Transylvanian forbearer and one of our Unitarian founders died in prison for the crime of innovation, of being curious about the Scriptures. So, this commitment is truly part of our DNA. Curiosity has consequences, so the cat learned. Yet we are here today because David wouldn't be silenced. Let's get and stay curious.

Then there is the commitment to being open to change—to have our minds changed; the promise to keep an open mind. Wow, so we have to be humble and admit that we might not have all the answers. If we keep an open mind we open ourselves to the exciting possibility of change and growth!

The commitment to individual conscience and the value of each person. Sound familiar? Maybe because it is similar to our 5th UU Principle, "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process." So, a commitment to search our conscience for what is right and true and then to act on it. That's healthy for us and for our wider community.

Our final March lesson will be on the Commitment to caring or, compassion. This lesson extends our commitments by asking us to put our caring into action. It asks us to, "Commit to treating the struggles of others as our own."

Has thinking about commitment in these ways changed your way of thinking about it?

In this edition of Music Notes, I want to call out and honor the choir for their hard work and perseverance during this quarantine period. As you probably have heard, singing is one of the superspreader activities, and singing will probably be the last thing to come back on board when we think about returning (someday...). The choir and I have been dealing with that sadness for almost a year now. Maybe you have too. Do you miss singing together as a congregation? Or if you're not a singer yourself, do you miss hearing live singing in a common space?

Singing is very difficult to do together online. Zoom's latency makes it impossible to sing together, with almost a 2-second spread between connections. About 10 choir members join for a short time every Thursday on a software called Jamulus, where we can sort of sing together with almost no (~50 ms) latency. But it's clunky and technically challenging and just isn't the same....

But the choir carries on, meeting every Thursday to connect with each other, work on sight-reading, and practice (without hearing each other) our next recording project. They record on their own, with a guide track in their headphones, and send in their file weeks before they hear the completed project in a service. It's a disjointed and individualistic musical pursuit, much less satisfying than the connected and communal choral singing we all love and long to do again. But it's better than nothing. And we are collecting a catalog of videos that we will be able to enjoy forever.

Next time you see a choir member, give them some appreciation for all they are doing to keep music at OCUUC limping along until we are able to sing together in person.

I also wanted to make sure you knew that there's a new Playlist on our YouTube channel (youtube.com/orangecoastuu) with all the outside videos we use in services, such as the ones by Lea Morris, Vienna Teng, and Meg Barnhouse.

<u>Spring Auction:</u> Do not use until the NEXT Auction (March 2021 at the earliest).

<u>Fall Auction:</u> This is only for purchases you made at the last Auction in November 2020.

<u>Contributions:</u> This is for contributions that will go ONLY to the Church. Any money here will NOT be shared with our PlateShare recipient.

<u>Plate:</u> This is for contributions to be shared between OCUUC and our monthly Plateshare recipient.

Pledge 19-20: Do Not Use

MDF Ministers Disc Fund: Self-explanatory.

<u>Pledge 20-21:</u> This is for your current Operating Fund Pledge

<u>Sanctuary Fund:</u> This is for pledges made in the first round of pledging for the new sanctuary.

Operating Fund Pledge Drive Fiscal Year 2021/2022

Well, here we are after operating "socially-distanced" and avoiding spreading COVID-19 for a year! We've done well, we've survived through a steep learning curve with Zoom and been running our meetings and our church services using that powerful tool. During Sunday services in March and April you will see some behind the scenes videos of what it takes to bring the church into your home.

We even conducted last year's Operating Fund Pledge Drive using only electronic communications and the US Mail - and we did well - thank you so much for all who contributed! This helped keep OCUUC going throughout the pandemic.


