Vulnerability

I've been almost 10 years with this wonderful, beloved community and because of that I feel more comfortable sharing some of my own vulnerabilities/my full humanity with you. We've developed a trusting relationship and you all have held my wounds gently and lovingly.

Being vulnerable is one of the hardest things we can do, and yet so important. It's important that we can all be the authentic beings that we are – warts, beauty and all. For me, learning to be vulnerable has been hard, but if I want to be authentic with you all, it means sometimes showing some old wounds. It's hard to know when to share deep wounds or scars, whether you will be safe or not judged; whether people will truly listen or try to "fix" you. Sometimes, you just want to be heard.

So I want to remind you all that if you need a safe place to speak from your wounds or your heart, you have it with me and the Pastoral Care Team (Laurie, Judith, Birdie and Marilyn). We are all here to listen without judgement, without advice being given — just be here with you.

I have had people tell me "I've never told anyone this before..." and it's such an honor to be trusted in that way. Please know that this church and I hold you in a circle of love. Here you are safe. Here you are loved.

Town Hall Meeting on New Sanctuary this Sunday, March 5th!

The Sanctuary Construction Committee is dismayed with the recent bid for \$2.7M for our new sanctuary. We have reviewed the bid in detail and have a prepared a report, which begins on this page. We have recommended to the Board, and the Board agrees, that we take a break and rebid the job in the Fall. Our reasoning is in our report.

While this does not need formal congregation action, we do feel we need to talk. It affects all of us. We don't expect the Fall bid will come in at our original budget amount, so we also need to talk about our options.

Childcare will be available. We will start 15 minutes after the service ends. We understand that this is short notice, but there is a lot happening this month and we didn't want to wait. The meeting will be recorded, but this is your chance to voice your thoughts as well as hear from others. We hope to see you on site or on Zoom!

SANCTUARY CONSTRUCTION REPORT

Feb. 22, 2023

Chronology

Fri., 1/20 Bid received by email from General Contractor (HABC) through Architect (Domus). Amount is \$2.267M. When non contractor costs like building permits and architects' fees are added, the new total cost of construction would be \$2.696 M. This is roughly a 50% increase in costs.

Mon., 1/23 Sanctuary Construction Committee meets on Zoom to debrief and kvetch.

Thurs., 1/26 SCC meets with HABC and Domus to review possible cost savings identified by Domus. HABC has some additional ideas and will work on possibilities.

Mon., 1/30 Craig and Nancy meet with Domus and HABC and an expeditor to gather information on possible strategies for working with the city on requirements.

Wed, 2/1 HABC presents their proposed changes and we discuss what might be acceptable and alternatives. They will explore further changes per our discussion.

Thurs., 2/2 SCC meets in Victoria Room to review plans and discuss alternatives.

Monday, 2/13 HABC suggests additional changes

Status

At this point, the SCC feels we have pushed as hard as is productive on HABC and Domus. We have considered all their suggestions. The short answer is that we can probably save about \$200k by changes that we consider acceptable, and there could be another \$100k in changes that we really hate to accept. They are:

- o No dropped ceiling there is a dropped ceiling in the drawings. It would be open ductwork. We had already accepted a lower cost finish
- o Main opening changed from wide open Nanodoors to series of four storefront doors
- o Carpeting on the podium instead of hardwood floors.

The source of the increase seems to be 75% from inflation and 25% from the increased requirements.

Alternatives

We have considered getting one or more additional bids. We agreed we would have a sole source contractor, but we could get other bids at some cost to the relationship. We do feel that HABC is honest and straightforward with us. It took about two months to get this bid, as it is a very complex process (over a holiday) that requires getting bids from several subcontractors. We may have trouble finding other contractors to invest that level of time in us without payment or confidence they may get the job. We have done a little research to check some of the subcontractors' bids.

Anecdotally, we are hearing this level of cost increase is not uncommon in today's market. The news and our contacts say this is typical. However, we are also hearing that the market may be turning around and may be more favorable to us in a few months. For example, lumber futures prices spiked during the pandemic, but have nearly returned to normal levels. HABC reports this is not yet reflected in wholesale prices.

It has been suggested that one solution may be to ask to phase the work. If we just built the basic shell right now, and added the ceiling and landscaping later, we would have a lower initial outlay. When we consider the effect of interest rates on our projected mortgage payments, we worry that it may be a long time before this is feasible. We could certainly do another fundraising campaign.

Another solution might be to do some of the work ourselves. We feel the projects we might take on are not going to make a significant change in our costs.

Finally, we might have some success in asking the City to give us a variance on some of the requirements. We have some good contacts and the discussion with the expeditor helped us develop a strategy. While we may have some success with this, it will take time and is not going to yield savings that will totally solve our problem.


This month, our special guest speaker will be Stephanie Campbell, President of the OC Chapter Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

The other option we might have is scaling down the overall size of the building. We may be able to avoid some of the requirements if it were smaller. It means completely starting over with the architect and planning. Although we might be faster the second time around, it is an extended process.

Recommendation

The Sanctuary Construction Committee recommends that we wait and rebid these plans in the Fall using the savings we already identified and accepted. It is a risk. Prices could go up instead of down. It would allow us the time to work through an appeal to reduce some of the city requirements. It would also allow us more time to fundraise to meet what will certainly be more than \$1.8M.

Next Steps

We recommend a Town Hall meeting on this information early in March. [MAR. 5^{TH})

The SCC will get to work on more cost savings possibilities and working on a possible variance with the City.

We will need help in fundraising.

We are committed to a new sanctuary and feel the congregation is, too. The reasons for building it have not changed. We have come a long way and are so close!




StandUp for Kids - Orange County was launched in 2003 with a single focus: To end the cycle of youth homelessness in our community.

UUA GENERAL ASSEMBLY PITTSBURGH • JUNE 21 - 25, 2023

THINKING ABOUT GA?

The annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists will take place June 21-25, 2023, in Pittsburgh, PA. OCUUC is entitled to three delegates. The primary commitment of a delegate is to attend all plenary meetings, which occur each day, either in person or online. This year a revision of Article II of the bylaws, which address our purposes and principles, is on the agenda, and only delegates may vote. Delegates will also want to attend mini-assemblies, where amendments are proposed and discussion and debate occurs.

Until May 15, adult fulltime registration is \$500, while a full virtual registration is \$300. There is also a no-fee delegate option for delegates who attend only business meetings (plenary sessions, mini-assemblies, etc.). For more information, see www.uua.org/ga.
