THE PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE

April has been a busy and exciting month! I am so proud of all of us! We had a great kickoff to our Pledge Drive, welcomed six new members, had a staffed table at the local Earth Day celebration to promote our Environmental Film Festival, and we created and implemented an amazing program to support Ukrainian Refugees. Whew!

Since I was most involved with the Ukrainian Refugee Program, I particularly want to call out all the volunteers who have made it happen. In about ten days, we went from recognizing an urgent need to welcoming our first refugees. We have hosted ten people - all of them chased from their homes by the war in Ukraine. As I write this, our family of six has left to be with their sponsor in Cleveland. We still have three adults and one child staying in the two-story building.

I have been so impressed by our support and volunteerism. Thank you to the Task Force - Rev. Sian, Tracey D., Briana M., Debra Q., Meg W., Judith S., and Tatiana H. and me! They provided the organization and flexibility to make this happen. Thank you to the 40-50 of you who contributed bedding, air mattresses, food, driving, on-site mentoring, and just wanted to do whatever was needed. We are so awesome!

Although we envisioned this program ending when we were ready to demolish the building for our new sanctuary, it may be over by May. The State Department changed

the process for immigration by Ukrainians and shut down their border crossings on April 25th. The new program is better organized and will suit everyone's needs in a more organized fashion. We are still concerned about those who may have been caught in the transition.

Thank you, thank you, to everyone who makes our congregation happen! This month, I am especially grateful.

NEW SANCTUARY UPDATE

The New Sanctuary Construction Committee continues to focus its efforts on work with our architect to provide additional materials requested by the new City of Costa Mesa planner. It has been a long and frustrating process that has recently culminated in contacts with experienced Assistant Director of Development Services, Scott Drapkin, to discuss concerns in hopes of expediting the review process.

Once review of the materials is completed by the planner, the project will finally move closer toward the City granting our building permit. Our team is patiently awaiting a reply from the City, and we'll let you know as soon as we get the green light.

Once the building permit is granted, our contractor will move forward with demolition of the two-story building where the sanctuary will be built. A "groundbreaking" event will be scheduled to take place at a date TBD. Construction fencing will be installed, and a portion of the parking lot will be cordoned off to accommodate the staging area for construction. The remainder of the church campus will remain open throughout construction, which is anticipated to last 10 months.

Looking on the bright side of the unanticipated delay, until demolition is scheduled, we have been able to provide a safe space for Ukrainian refugee families.


Both Mifanwy and John, while attending the Congregation on Victoria Street, helped prepare meal boxes for delivery where needed.

Stitchwits meet on Zoom every Saturday from 10:30am to 12:30pm and are knitting, crocheting, or sewing items for Stand Up for Kids.



STAND UP FOR KIDS—ORANGE COUNTY serves homeless and at-risk youth and young adults aged 25 and younger. Programs in Orange County offer street outreach, mentoring, housing support and so much more. Programs have the overall goal of leading homeless youth to self-sufficiency and preventing at-risk youth from gang involvement, substance abuse, teen pregnancy, and from dropping out of high school.

ELEVATOR SPEECHES

In 2004, <u>UU World</u> magazine asked for contributions of "elevator speeches" explaining Unitarian Universalism. These are short speeches that could be made in the course of an elevator ride to those who knew nothing of the religion. Here are examples of the speeches submitted:

In Unitarian Universalist congregations, we gather in community to support our individual spiritual journeys. We trust that openness to one another's experiences will enhance our understanding of our own links with the divine, with our history, and with one another.

Most Unitarian Universalists believe that no body has a monopoly on all truth, or ultimate proof of the truth of everything in any one belief. Therefore, one's own truth is unprovable, as is that of others. Consequently, we should respect the beliefs of others, as well as their right to hold those beliefs. Conversely, we expect that others should respect our right to our own beliefs. Several UU's then, would likely hold as many different beliefs. Other beliefs they may hold in common are a respect for others, for nature, and for common decency, leading to a particular caring for the poor, the weak and the downtrodden. As a result, issues of justice, including social justice are held in common among most.
