### TACO 'BOUT AN AUCTION!

The live auction is May 20, 2023, 4:30. The deadline to submit your items and events is May 7, after which bidding on "silent auction" items begins. Both of these things can be done at:

### www.togetherauction.com/ocuuc

While going online is the best and easiest way to submit and bid, if you are having difficulties, you can submit a paper form at the auction table on Sunday and request a proxy to assist with online bidding, or for live bidding on live items if you cannot attend on May 20 in person.

For those of you new to auction, allow me to elaborate! Twice a year, we fill our social calendars and acquire lovely things by bidding on them both through a website and in person at a fun-filled event.

Submissions of items is going on now and we are hoping for, longing for, and dreaming of, the many exciting, beautiful, thoughtful, enriching events and items only you can imagine! A walk in the park, a hike up a mountain or a slideshow of your hike up a mountain, a day at the beach or your pool, a game night or a night at a ball game, a

viewing of a movie, a live show or a sing along, a curated trip to a museum or a commissioned work of art, a crafting afternoon or a high tea, a dinner from a unique region or a favorite restaurant; the idea is that although we could do these things anytime, we decide to do them in this way, to give back to the church without which we would likely not know each other. As for the submission of physical things, like a bicycle, jewelry, books, vases, crafts and foods, we are looking for like-new items and things that you would find in a unique shop, rather than a yard sale.

Here are a couple of guidelines for submissions. First, if it is an event, we need to know the address where it will be held. Please include it in the description. People like to know what city an event will be in; it may affect their decision to bid. They need to know the date. It seems like "TBD" would be a good idea, but history has shown that without a set date, people will not want to bid on even fabulous events. We all know our schedules fluctuate, but if everyone involved gets their items offered/bought on their calendars early, they are likely to follow through. Whether you submit an item or event, a picture for the catalog is an absolute must. People want to buy what they can see. If you are offering a rock concert, a photo of a guitar would do well.

The online items are "silent" using your "paddle number" which is assigned when you register either online or in person. The online items will be open to bid for a week, closing at 9:00pm on the day of the live auction. The types of items biddable online are most of the tangible things that are donated with a few exceptions. You will know if an item is biddable because there will be a bidding option on the screen.

On Sundays before Auction, we ask for congregants to volunteer for various chores related to the live event, we sell dinner tickets so we will have an accurate catering

count, we ask for submissions for bidding, and we sell 50\50 raffle tickets.

For the live event, we have a dinner and live auction. This spring, our theme involves a dinner of tacos of different meats and veggies, rice and beans. When you arrive, between 4:00-4:30, you will check in, get your paddle, mingle and enjoy Markaritas. At 4:30 (approximately) dinner will be ready to serve. After our meal, we begin the live auction.

The types of items presented for live auction are most of the events, some services and some items. The auction committee determines which items will likely generate the most to benefit the church in either silent or live settings.

Our live auction works like most live auctions. We hand out paper catalogs the Sunday before the live event, May 14 and again at the event. The online catalog is now live and viewable as people add items to it daily. You decide what you would like to bid on. Opening bids are listed but of course we hope that the items sell for as much as people value them! Supposing a French dinner for 4 is offered with a starting bid of \$20.00, and the Jones family want 2 slots, they would hold up their bidding paddle AND two fingers indicating the two slots. If more than 4 paddles and/or fingers are being held up by participants (as one would expect for a French dinner) then the price will be raised in increments decided by the auctioneers until only 4 paddles/fingers remain. Those are the winning bidders. We will have items or events that have very few slots and some that have many or even unlimited slots. You should be able to come away having been a successful bidder whether you budget is very limited or lavish. In any case, you will have a great time!

After the live bidding, we offer dessert, and you may choose to pay for your winning

bids then. Once you get home, keep an eye on your silent online bids.



# PACIFIC SOUTHWEST SERVICE AREA ASSEMBLY DELEGATES' REPORT

April 24, 2023

Randy Kokal and Nancy Loughrey were our OCUUC delegates to the Camp de Benneville Pines Annual Meeting on April 22, 2023. They both attended virtually. Randy is also our local "de Benneville Rep".

Elections were held and six new and returning Board Members were elected unanimously. In addition, a Board Approved budget for the 23-24 fiscal year was presented and discussed. De Benneville has had many challenges in recent years, the pandemic, which closed the camp to campers for eighteen months, two major fires, a lightning strike, flash floods and record snowfall. The effect has been a significant loss of camper attendance. The new budget has only 45% of its revenue from camper fees, as management expects it will take five years to rebuild camper days to pre-pandemic levels. They are confident that they can raise the needed funds from new fundraising and reserves.

De Benneville needs our continuing support. OCUUC has a long history of supporting our favorite camp. A video at the end of the meeting included Birdie Reed, Clover and Paul Gethard, and Phyllis Kaplan! We continue our support through:

- Our OCUUC all-church weekend in the Fall (October 6-8<sup>th</sup> this year)
- Sponsorship through plate-sharing of our children and youth at camp sponsored events
- Using our communication systems to keep everyone informed of upcoming camps
- Many people make regular or occasional contributions directly to de Benneville.
- Volunteering at work parties and as camp program staff. Our own Randy Kokal is Dean of the Summer Break Camp for Adults & Singing in the Pines August 10-24, 2023.

Nancy was able to hear a compelling keynote address by members of the local Chumash Tribe. They are actively seeking to have the area off the Central California coast designated as a Marine Sanctuary to help protect our ocean and coast. This process has been going for many years. A draft designation from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) is expected in June, and they will be asking for letters of public support and comment. There was a full agenda from Friday evening to Sunday morning.

These assemblies are planned to continue annually. In 2024 the Ventura congregation will host and 2025 will be in San Diego.

In the spirit of our beloved District Assembly, Camp de Benneville Pines will be sponsoring a traditional assembly to bring members of our 50 churches together to enjoy an engaging keynote speaker, UU-themed workshops, music, worship, and other activities.
