The quote above describes how I have experienced working with the members and friends of OCUUC. We are the "little engine that could" when it comes to harnessing our ideas, energy, and actions to accomplish all things large and small.

Due to the roll out of Covid-19 vaccinations, California has moved into the "yellow tier" of California guidelines for reopening. Because of this we are resuming in person services and meetings at the church in accordance with those guidelines. We will continue to follow the current California guidelines for reopening as circumstances change.

As you know, the pandemic has created a new phenomenon for us all: we can choose to be Roomers or Zoomers when it comes to attending church services and meetings. These last few months, many people have been working to put plans, procedures, and technology in place to safely reopen for in person church services and meetings. Our first "hybrid" Sunday service, meaning meeting simultaneously in person and on Zoom, took place May 30, 2021

Many thanks to Nancy Loughrey, Property Use Group Co-Chair, for leading the reopening task force, and to Rev. Sian, Beth Syverson and many other volunteers who have worked on this challenging endeavor to move to

hybrid services. Special thanks to Steve Morihiro for his many hours of work to install upgraded audio and video equipment in Daniels Hall, Suite 4, and the Victoria Room so that we can conduct hybrid meetings and services.

Now that Covid restrictions have lessened, Meg Wilson, VP Finance, has been busy working with short-term renters who wish to return to holding their meetings and events on our campus. These short-term renters bring in much needed revenue and Meg has done a terrific job of managing all that goes along with bringing them back on campus.

The Buildings and Grounds Committee has been hard at work completing remodeling of many of our meeting spaces in the RE/Admin building and Daniels Hall and preparing the buildings for reopening.

Shown below is the newly remodeled Victoria Room which is now twice the size of the former room. This room now has TV monitors and equipment at both ends of the room to accommodate those accessing meetings via Zoom. Thanks to a special donation made by four OCUUC couples, the Victoria Room now has eight new tables which can be easily folded and rolled away to increase the versatility of the room.



All members are encouraged to attend the Annual Congregational Meeting which will be a hybrid service held both in person and via Zoom on Sunday, June 13, 2021, at 11:45 AM. Please watch the Blast for further Congregational Meeting announcements which will include links to the agenda, the slate of nominees for elected church

positions, the proposed budget, proposed bylaws changes, and the annual reports of all committees and church officers. Hard copies of these materials will be sent to those members who do not have online access.

The UUA General Assembly is again going to be held online this year due to the pandemic. The good news about this is that it is much easier and affordable to attend GA online than in person. Religious Education News from RE Minister Rev. Judy Tomlinson

Exciting news! We will all begin to meet in-person for worship and Religious Education just not in the same location. Back in April the Reopening Taskforce sent around a survey. On the basis of the information we received we got busy planning how to go about the reopening process. Parents told us that they didn't want their children and youth to meet indoors so the RE Committee and I searched out a suitable outdoor location. We found Estancia Park at the corner of Adams and Mesa Verde West, a short distance from our OCUUC campus. It is a safe distance from the street, has picnic tables, shade, a pleasant breeze, and restrooms. Parents will need to plan a little extra time into their Sunday morning to sign children and youth in at drop-off and get back to Estancia Park before 12:00 noon for pickup. Children and adults will wear masks and hand sanitizer will be at the ready.

Play is our theme for June. We will discover how play connects us. On our first Sunday at the park, June 6 at 10:30 AM, we will play community building games to help us get acquainted/reacquainted with each other. On June 13 a reptile presenter will show us some amazing animals and we can even touch and hold them! Later in the month we will celebrate Pride with rainbows, play pretend, and play with words. Summer Music at OCUUC:

It's almost time for our dear Orange Coast Choir to take a 2-month hiatus over the summer. If you have the opportunity, please thank the choir for their continued patience and spirit of adventure as they go with the flow in this changing Covid landscape. We are still creating virtual choir videos, and we have been holding hybrid rehearsals for about 2 months now -- in the church courtyard + on Zoom. The rehearsals have been a major improvement over all-Zoom rehearsals, because now we can hear each other sing in real time. But we are still masked and distanced, so our sound is muffled and hard to hear. Steve Morihiro, Phil Chipman, and Craig Spery have been spending lots of time and energy to create a sound system containing 5 mics and 5 monitors so the choir can hear themselves better, both in the courtyard and on Zoom. AND we are very much looking forward to the day when it is safe to sing indoors again, all squished together in the choir loft. For now, we will take what we can get and cherish the community singing we are able to do at this time.

While the choir is off for two months, I plan to host two or three all-community singalongs in the courtyard. We will need to be masked and distanced, but if you've been missing singing (or hearing) hymns together, this will be a chance to remember how that felt...sort of. Keep an eye out for an announcement soon. And this summer, there will be more opportunities for soloists and small groups to perform live or on video for

our worship services. If you have an idea for a performance you'd like to do, just let me know.

For now, those who come to worship in Daniels Hall on Sunday mornings are asked NOT to sing (except the song leader or soloist). Zoomers can sing to their heart's content during the worship service though.

Thank you for being patient and caring during this liminal period when we are all trying to transition to our New Normal. Since singing uses so much air, it is one of the more dangerous Covid-spreading activities, so we will be cautious. The AUUMM (Association of UU Music Ministries) is providing well-singing, and I am modeling our approach on their suggestions.

While the choir's away this summer, there will be more opportunities for soloists and small groups to perform live or on video for our worship services. If you have an idea for a performance you'd like to do, just let me know.

Lastly, I'd like to give another shout-out to Steve Morihiro, who has been the organizer and implementer of all the new tech that's been required to create our hybrid services and meetings. The church is super-lucky to have someone so knowledgeable and generous. Next time you see Steve, please give him your special appreciation.

THE BIG QUESTION:

"When may we come back on site?"

Almost time!

Our first service back onsite was May 30th. Yeah! Orange County reached Yellow Tier, and we are prepared to move forward. Of course, we will also continue on Zoom. We know everyone is not ready or able to return onsite. Many people are also anxious to see each other in person. One of the Task Force's guiding principles has been that everyone will make that decision for themselves, and we will all respect and honor their decision.

On May 23rd, the service was mostly broadcast from Daniels Hall. It was only open to those involved in creating the service, so it was a surprise to many. Things were the same and different. We have a new camera in Daniels Hall for better visibility, and Suite 4 and the Victoria Room can now participate through Zoom.

Until mid-June, we will require masks and set up the chairs to allow for physical distancing. Windows will be open in Daniels Hall. Registration will be required, so everyone will know they have a seat before they arrive. Registration will open at 9:00 am on Saturdays, and we ask that you register by 9:00 am on Sunday so we can set the chairs appropriately. We have upgraded our technology to better integrate the Roomers and Zoomers. Here is a Frequently Asked Questions document (link to document https://ocuuc.org/wp-content/uploads/FAQ-

 $\underline{\text{Reopening.pdf}}$) to explain the details and hopefully answer many questions.

We are watching registration carefully to see how everyone is "voting with their feet". We

may make adjustments to accommodate concerns or additional people as things progress. After June 15th, California guidelines will change, and we will comply. We may designate some rooms to not require physical distancing or masks.

Sanctuary Construction Committee Update

At a recent weekly Zoom meeting our sanctuary construction committee met with our *domusstudio* architect David Keitel to discuss the timeline of the project now that we are further along in the design development phase.

Just as COVID has affected so many aspects of our lives over the past year, it has also had an impact upon the construction industry, with increased prices for in-demand building materials including lumber. The impact of these price hikes and unanticipated code requirements discovered by our civil engineer in his due diligence have caused the architect to need to modify their design plans for the exterior of the sanctuary to keep our project costs in line and meet the code requirements. However, the sanctuary interior plans remain the same.

In addition to the design revisions, our project timeline has also moved into early 2022 for a construction groundbreaking in January. Project completion is now set for September 2022. Perhaps this delay will allow the lumber prices in particular to settle back down once the post-COVID demand has subsided somewhat.

At our last Zoom meeting for May, David presented us with some revised design concepts for our review and direction. Once our committee has reached consensus on the revised exterior plan, we will be sharing it with all of you in the congregation with more information about the design revisions. Sanctuary Capital Campaign Update

You may have noticed that during our successful annual operating campaign headed by Sandie Martin that the sanctuary capital campaign was in a "quiet phase" in support of Sandie and her team.

Now that the canvass has wrapped up, I'd like to give you an update on the sanctuary fundraising. Payment on existing pledges and new gifts to the capital campaign as well as Beth's 20^{th} anniversary continue to come in.

Thanks to all of you for your generosity! When we are nearing groundbreaking in December and January, we will have a special groundbreaking fundraising drive offering the opportunity for additional year-end gifts if you feel inclined to do s

As per our agreement with the stewards, they will now begin making congregants aware of the sculpture collection bestowed to OCUUC by longtime artist member Issa Graves. Issa and her husband Bob were active members of OCUUC. Dave Carlson is overseeing the project and has coordinated delivery of the sculptures to the church campus. He has had the sculptures appraised by a professional appraiser referred to him by curators at the Long Beach Museum of Art. Dave is in charge of marketing the individual sculptures to congregants and the greater community.

Fifty percent of the income from the sculptures will go to the endowment with 50 percent to the sanctuary fund. Stay tuned for more information in the coming weeks. Dave can be reached at davecarlson715@gmail.com for more information.


Board Minutes and Reports
