#### PRODUCERS BEN KALINA AND AMANDA LIPP TO ATTEND FALL ENVIRONMENTAL FILM FESTIVAL IN COSTA MESA

The 4th Annual Orange Coast Wild & Scenic Film Festival is proud to announce that award-winning documentary producers

Ben Kalina's work explores the colliding forces of human nature and environmental change. His most recent film, *A River Reborn*, is one of the featured documentaries in this year's Festival lineup of 10 short films. Following the screening of his film Kalina will talk about the making of *A River Reborn* and will be available for Q & A.

Amanda Lipp's documentaries focus on mental health and social impact storytelling. Her festival film *ReBuilding Butte* follows a heartfelt tiny house building project in response to the deadliest fire in California history—the 2018 Camp Fire—that destroyed Paradise and surrounding Butte County communities. The story follows Alyssa Nolan, a local resident and mother of three, who learned how to build tiny homes by watching YouTube videos. The tiny home build site became a place for recovery and community. Alyssa, who continues her work as head of the Tiny Home Foundation, will also be attending the festival in September. Both

Amanda and Alyssa will talk about the film and will be available for Q & A.

The 4th Annual Orange Coast Wild & Scenic Film Festival is one of more than 150 "On Tour" events held throughout the United States and the only one of its kind in Orange County. The Nevada City, California-based flagship Wild & Scenic Film Festival, a five-day event held annually in January, partners with local groups seeking to inspire environmental activism and a love for nature through film.

### FORMING FAITH

Religious Education News Karen Magoon Pearson Director of Religious Education

We've been having a joyful and service-filled summer in Religious Education. We began our Magic Summer curriculum from Soul Matters in July, encompassing the three S's of Silence, Service, and Sunshine. We have experienced silence through a guided meditation that had us imagining ourselves as a sprouting seed, an activity in which we mindfully passed a cup of water without spilling a drop, a meditation on the meaningfulness of books, and a loving kindness meditation.

Our first act of service was planting wildflower seeds to take home and nurture in our own neck of the woods. The following week we did a deep dive into water justice, focusing on the daily journey of women and children in remote areas of Ethiopia who spend up to 6 hours a day retrieving what is ultimately barely enough unclean water for their families to survive. On our third Sunday we wrote secret book notes to hide in our RE library and hopefully delight future readers who come across them unexpectedly. Our most recent service project was picking up trash around our church campus.

We've also enjoyed ourselves by creating a maze for ping pong balls; completing an obstacle course while carrying a bucket of water and trying not to spill it; playing a game with words, pictures, and water balloons; and playing the classic game of follow the leader outside in the sunshine. I hope your summer has been as fulfilling, meaningful, and fun as ours has been so far!



I just got back from my first Association for Unitarian Universalist Music Ministries (AUUMM) Conference in 3 years. This year it was in Ann Arbor, and we really lucked out with good weather plus a GIANT art festival happening in town last week. My cup has been filled up by SO. MUCH. SINGING and camaraderie with my wonderful colleagues. There were only about 100 attendees in person this year, much fewer than normal, and we didn't have a conference choir with a choral clinician like we usually do. They would've had to book the clinician months ago, when we didn't even know if the conference was feasible. But other than that, all the other elements were there.

I led two choral reading sessions, where a colleague and I chose a diverse assortment of new-ish music for everyone to read together. This is one of the primary ways we choir directors learn about new music. It's so much easier to get a feel for a piece after experiencing it sung live than just by glancing at the score visually. I also sang in two services with a small ad hoc group of singers. I taught a workshop about the AUUMM Music Database, which I created years ago, and which is starting to get some real traction with users. I attended several workshops including a conducting master class, a song leading master class, and a sound bath (which was AMAZING) that was billed as "Take a Nap And I'll Sing Lullabies To You." Brilliant!

I organized a group of 10 of us to venture downtown to the art festival and to one of only two vegan restaurants in the area. It's during these social times where stories are swapped, connections are deepened, and new friends are made. Plus we had fun at our Open Mic Night at the hotel one evening. We have some world class talent in our membership, including Jim Scott (Gather the Spirit, etc.) and many others.

The theme for the conference this year was Renewal, and the worship services every morning did just that - renewed my spirit. They had a UUA representative talking about how we as music directors can deal with our own and our congregants' trauma from the pandemic. She urged us to think about what we learned from having to shift our whole job around for the quarantine: Were there things that we'd like to keep from the shifts we've made? Were there things we realized we didn't need anymore? Were there things that we really missed from The Before Times and want to reincorporate, and were there things we used for a time during the quarantine but are ready to release now?

Thank you to the OCUUC Board and congregation for once again supporting my professional development by sending me to this conference every year. Just about everything I know about UU music comes from

these conferences and from my connections with my AUUMM friends in between conferences.


