AUUMM (Association of Unitarian Universalist Music Ministries) sponsored an online workshop about how to handle overwhelm and trauma, presented by the creator of The Trauma Stewardship Institute, Laura Lipsky. She reminded us of how traumatic the last 18 months have been for the whole globe, dealing with the upheaval that Covid and our faulty response to it has wreaked. Her list of side effects of Overwhelm and Trauma rang true for me and so many of my colleagues: saturated nervous system, lack of presence, disheartened, feeling helpless, anger, etc. But she also gave us a list of survival skills we can use when we are feeling overwhelmed or traumatized: admire art, go outside, be active, spend time with animals, etc. I know for me, music-making has always been my key survival skill. (No pun intended.) I hope you all can dig into your toolbox and find the things that help bring you back to your present body and bring you peace during this difficult time.

I am particularly saddened to bring the choir back to Zoom-only rehearsals, after spending several months in hybrid rehearsals, with many of us singing in our courtyard with masks on. This fall, the choir will continue creating recordings, and I will continue to try my best to bring you uplifting and meaningful music on Sunday mornings, in whatever form that takes. Thank you all for your flexibility and patience. Hopefully we'll all be able to sing together again soon!

#### **FLU SHOTS**

From your Faith Community Nurse Marilyn Giss

We will be holding our **Fall Flu Clinic** on Saturday, October 2nd from 10a.m.-1 p.m. Although a room as been scheduled, I believe it is safer and just as efficient to have this be a drive-through clinic as we did last year. Flu vaccine will be given to those 9 years of age and older. This year we will have additional senior dose vaccine available. I will have students to assist but would welcome additional volunteers from church who could assist with set up and take down of tables and chairs. Please contact me if you can help.

The CA Department of Public Health states: "In an effort to prevent a 'twindemic' of COVID-19 and seasonal influenza," they are urging all Californians, 6 months of age and older, to get vaccinated against the flu. Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness that can cause mild to severe illness. A bad case of the flu can result in hospitalization or even death. Older adults and those with certain health conditions, are at high risk of serious flu complications. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting vaccinated."



#### ONE STEP BACK

The increasing numbers of infections of COVID19 in Orange County have caught the attention of all of us. Our numbers continue to increase and have not peaked. Although government agencies have not recommended shutting down, the <u>UUA guidance</u> has shifted and is recommending more restrictive measures. The Returning to Onsite Task Force has struggled with the evolving information.

We will continue to offer onsite services in addition to Zoom, but will return to physical distancing in Daniels Hall. This means we are returning to the registration system we used in June. If you would like to attend services on site this Sunday, please register with the link that will be in the Saturday morning email. It is not necessary to register for RE in the Park. In addition, we have noticed It is difficult to stay distanced when it is a noisy

Mark your calendars for the UU Men's Fellowship Fall Renewal now scheduled to occur at Camp deBenneville Pines on October 29-31, with an option to arrive on Thursday, October 28. Attendance will be limited to 65 persons, and all attendees must have had their full COVID-19 vaccinations completed prior to October 7th. Attendees must also be free of any signs or symptoms of new infection such as elevated temperature, loss of appetite, malaise, or be exposed to others with such. A \$200 fee this fall includes all meals and lodging. Scholarships are available to persons in need of such. Our theme will center around the masks we wear, and how these masks might help us or hinder us.
