FORMING FAITH

Religious Education News Karen Magoon Pearson Director of Religious Education

Throughout November, we all shared in the theme of Holding History. In our Religious Education program, that involved a lot of "truthful telling" and honesty about some painful parts of our nation's past. These truths can be very difficult for adults to share with children and youth and doing so in a developmentally appropriate way can be a challenge. Nevertheless, my goal for our program is to push forward boldly, past our own hang ups as adults, and be honest with our children about the hard things in our history (and our present) in a way that we ourselves did not always experience in our youth.

This search for the true history is reflected in our Fourth Principle: "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning" and our proposed Eighth Principle: "Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions." Our faith has taken up this work and called on white UU's to be especially vigilant about the work of correcting stories that have caused harm. It is only through truth-telling that we can bring about healing.

One topic we told the truth about with our younger group this month was Native American residential schools. Beginning in the 1870s and continuing into the 1980s, boarding schools were created to "educate" Native Americans about Western culture. Children—some as young as five years old—were removed from their homes and sent away. Families who resisted were threatened with legal punishment.

The schools were deliberately located far from home. It was thought that separating children from their communities would make the assimilation process faster and more complete. Forced to abandon their Native American beliefs, clothing, and customs, and to learn and speak only English, the children were stripped of their Native American identity, culture, and history. Physical abuse, malnutrition, and other horrific conditions were common. Generations of Native American children were traumatized by their experiences, and the repercussions of this national travesty are still being felt, as highlighted by this article that discusses how the loss of Native American languages has been accelerated due to the pandemic. Although many communities are now working to reclaim, revitalize, and preserve their rich and diverse cultures, some languages and traditions have been lost forever.

This truthful telling is important work. What could you learn more about to challenge the historical lies you grew up with? Is there a child or youth in your life with whom you could share some truth?

The choir is preparing a beautifully nostalgic song for a special video for Christmas Eve. I am looking for family Christmas photos from your childhood. Please email me digital copies of your favorite Christmas memories by December 15. The choir will sing our traditional "Peace, Peace" live with candlelight as well. Our Christmas Eve service will also be a hybrid service, so you can choose which way you'd like to attend.

After all these festivities are over, I will be away for several weeks on a sabbatical, until March 14, 2022. Steve Morihiro, Barbara Morihiro, and Sarah Hunter are working closely with me this month to get things ready for when I'm away, and they will be coordinating all the worship music while I'm gone. NEW SANCTUARY CAPITAL CAMPAIGN YEAR END UPDATE

As you make your year-end financial planning decisions, please keep in mind your new sanctuary capital campaign pledges.

To date we have received 97% of the pledges made in the first round of the campaign beginning in fall 2018. We are grateful for those of you who have generously fulfilled your commitments with payments either paid in full or spread over the three years of the pledge.

Our 2020 relaunch campaign pledge commitments to bolster phase one of the campaign are coming in strong also, currently at over 55%. Thank you to everyone who has honored their relaunch pledge and have even exceeded their original dollar amount.

Of course, we WELCOME additional pledges and gifts of any amount, large and small, to the capital campaign. The more we give, the less we will need to borrow as we begin incurring greater expenses in 2022 as the project moves into high gear.

DECEMBER SANCTUARY UPDATE

The sanctuary committee met with the architect, domusstudio, on November 10 on Zoom to discuss project status and information requested by the City of Costa Mesa for approval of the Development Review Plan. Committee members who worked on the original new sanctuary plan back in 2013 were able to access important documents from that project including the shared parking agreement with Piecemakers and Torelli Real Estate. Additionally, we contacted Dig Alert to verify that the location of the existing underground utilities would not affect construction of the new building. Verification was received that there were no issues with the utilities.

Another important step in the project took place on November 19 when project lead architect David Keitel and I met at Costa Mesa City Hall with Associate Planner Katelyn Walsh and Assistant Planner Jarrod Coleman. Due to COVID restrictions, this was the first in person meeting held with the planners. All prior communications between our architects and the City planners have taken place via e-mail, phone and Zoom. During this important meeting we provided feedback in writing and verbally to address any outstanding issues on the Development Review Plan.

David requested that building plans be allowed to be submitted concurrently as the planning requirements go forward for review, which is dependent on the parking analysis element of the project. Katelyn indicated she hoped to follow through on the parking analysis and other items before she turned over the project lead to Jarrod, who will be replacing her on City staff as she heads to other employment. She also indicated they hoped to make a site visit before her departure.

The next Zoom meeting of the entire committee and architectural team will be held on December 1. Work will continue on tying down all the details for approval so that the building permit can be obtained and the project can move forward according to schedule with demolition and groundbreaking in February.

Do you knit, crochet, sew, or enjoy any other crafts? Do you believe in using your skills to help others? Then you might be a StitchWit!


Stitchwits meet on Zoom every Saturday from 10:30am to 12:30pm and are knitting, crocheting, or sewing items for Stand Up for Kids.

RETURNING TO ONSITE POLICY UPDATES

The Returning to Onsite Task Force continues to monitor the status of infections and hospitalizations in Orange County as well as guidance from scientific organizations. We have added carbon dioxide monitors and increased ventilation in Daniels Hall and have been able to encourage masked singing by everyone in the room. We are also sanctioning eating indoors as long as food is served by just a few servers.

We are requiring that anyone coming onsite to be fully vaccinated if a vaccine is available for them. It is the honor system, no one wants to worry about cards. It also won't be perfect - we will still welcome visitors, and children with their vaccinated parents.

- Indoors Masks are still required for all indoor activities. We have resumed singing with masks in Daniels Hall.
- Outdoors Masks and physical distancing will be encouraged but not required outside on Sundays after the service. Coffee will be available. Each person must monitor and maintain their own comfort level. The courtyard is a special place, and it is easy to flip back to pre-COVID practices. Let's keep each other safe!

The Omicron mutation is too new for information on changing our policies at this point, but of course we will be monitoring its status.
