Are We Getting Close?

Yes! But we aren't there yet. Our building drawings for our new sanctuary for their second review the day after Thanksgiving, which means we hopefully have very few changes left to be done. Our architect is also supplying those drawings to our contractor so they can prepare an accurate bid. Yippee!

Now for the hard part. The Sanctuary Construction Committee and the Board have been watching carefully. Given that it has been almost two years since we got the last bid and that the City is requiring us to add some more improvements than we originally proposed, we are anticipating a price increase. The question is, how much? We won't know until we get that proposal from the contractor. However, we are getting ready. The contractor is ready to go once we sign a contract. However, we know we may need time to consider the proposal.

On Sunday, December 11th, there will be a Town Hall Meeting to present our current situation. We may or may not have a bid by then, but it should be useful to understand our resources and options. We are also calling a Special Congregation Meeting for Sunday, January 8th after church as necessary. The January 8th date is tentative. If the bid is low, we won't need it, or if it is very high, leadership may need more time to prepare. Please mark it on your calendar as it is likely.

I'm really looking forward to 2023. In addition to the construction, we have some celebrations to anticipate. It will be ten years since Rev. Sian became our minister and ten years since we moved from Victoria Street to our current site. Don't miss the service on December 4th – we will be celebrating 50 years of membership for Jeanne Criss and Shirley Thorne. There will be cake!

There is a lovely story I read recently about the history of the Christmas tree. Christmas trees were brought over to the US by German immigrants, but they were made famous by Harriet Martineau, a

writer and abolitionist, who had been invited to the family of Rev. Charles Follen, a Unitarian, to stay with them over Christmas. Charles and his wife had secretly brought a tree into the house (usually Christmas trees were outside) unbeknownst to their three young children and had decorated it with candles and toys. After dinner that evening, the doors to the living room were thrown open and the children who had been running around as children do, stopped in their tracks and stared in wonder at the amazing sight of that tree, all lit up and glowing. As we make our way through the rest of the holidays of 2022, do take care of yourself. Play your favorite music and fill your days with the holiday traditions that make you happy.



FIRST AMENDMENT AUDITORS

There has been a recent surge in activity by self-styled First Amendment Auditors in Orange County. They appeared at another UU Church in Fullerton last Sunday. These are people who try to provoke reactions from police and government officials in order to video them and put them out to the public. The police are now wise to their tactics and refuse to engage as long there is no trespass, assault or other activity that is illegal. Please remember that the first amendment applies to governments and not private individuals or organizations.

The Orange County Sheriff's Department considers these people a very low threat and an annoyance. Their advice is to ignore them as much as possible. If they stay off the property, they have a right to be there unless they block access in or out. If they come onto the property we can ask them to leave. If they disrupt the service we will respond by calling 911. Remember, these groups have never been violent. Their goal is to try to goad the police into suppressing their first amendment rights. If we ever have the misfortune to attract this group to our sanctuary, I hope we can provide them with a flat, boring experience unworthy of a YouTube video.






AGNOSTICS, HUMANISTS AND ATHEISTS
