I find this quote so helpful... for both meditation practice and everyday life!

My life as a college professor involves many tasks and sometimes unexpected additions to my “To Do” list as I go about my day. One day, I was quickly attempting to write an extra make-up exam for my neuroanatomy class (helping out a student who was sick for the main exam), and caught myself feeling frustrated, asking myself “Why did I agree to this?” getting ready to break out into a sweat!

As my mindfulness (present-moment awareness) practice deepens, I have become increasingly conscious of myself feeling stressed, resistant or even downright angry while doing some of these tasks, feeling that whatever I am doing, I should get through it quickly so that I can do something *else*! This has been a not-fully-conscious habit. Becoming aware of this and remembering Mr. Emerson’s quote, I was able to begin finding a way to focus on the task at hand and enjoy it for its own sake, to not rush or pressure myself and be fully present for the task before moving to the next one. I find that each little task can become quite enjoyable when approached this way, and it gets done just fine and in plenty of time!

This “approach of nature” could also apply to cooking, doing handiwork, or any action in one’s daily life. AND being present also can allow one to wisely choose the number of tasks to do (after all, there is a limit to the number of tasks we can do in a day and still remain healthy and sane!).
