Religious Education News

Summer is almost here. You can smell it in the air. Finals, graduations and proms are on the horizon. Summer camp and vacation trips dance in our heads.

Here at OCUUC our Religious Education and Exploration our summer program will run from July 7 to September 1. We have two programs planned.

For the Nursery through 1st graders, we will use a Dr. Seuss-story-based curriculum, called *Dr. Seuss Changed My Life*. Personally, I had my political awakening reading *The Starbelly Sneetches*, so I know first-hand that Theodore Geisel's books are more than catchy rhyming literature. There are many life lessons that sync nicely with our UU Principles, like peace in the Butter Battle Book and the environment in *The Lorax*.

The 2nd-7th graders will go in the mad scientist direction. Jennifer Abt has written a science-experiment-oriented curriculum based on the TV series *Mythbusters* that ran on the Discovery Channel from 2003-2016. We will conduct real experiments based on hypotheses which we will prove true—or we will bust them—and we will, no doubt, find others that need further investigation. How much lift does a helium balloon really have? What happens when you run an electric current through a pickle? Come and find out.

But what about the Youth Group teens? We will be asking the youth to take a leadership role over the summer. They will be asked to assist in the classroom and, when they are ready, to even take the lead in presenting a lesson plan. They will always be working with an adult in the classroom. Intern Minister Rica Kaufel and I will

host a teacher training for our youth on Sunday, June 9 during regular class time. We will also hold a Youth Group retreat at the end of June to make plans for next year's Youth Group program on leadership. The retreat will be a combination of fun, group bonding, cooking, eating and planning!

The Religious Education and Exploration Committee will also hold a retreat. It will be held on June 29 and hosted by the Kilchoer family. We will talk philosophy, curriculum and special events. If you have ideas to share, now would be a great time before we put the program into place. This is also a great time to get involved. Please let me know if you would like to be an RE volunteer. I believe we all add beauty to the world, and our creation sparkle most brilliantly if they reflect our unique selves,

About de Benneville Pines

Camp deBenneville Pines is a retreat and conference center located in the Barton Flats area of the San Bernardino National Forest, about 90 miles east of Los Angeles. At an elevation of 6,800 feet, the camp is surrounded by a forest of towering pines, cedars, and oaks.

Facilities include a beautiful heated swimming pool (open in season), a hot tub, children's playground, an archery range, and opportunities for many outdoor sports in season including hiking, snowshoeing, sledding, as well as fishing and canoeing in nearby Jenks Lake. Cabins are all equipped with modern bathrooms and hot showers, and offer comfortable sleeping quarters. Delicious meals are prepared by the talented kitchen staff and served in our main lodge.

OCUUC Fiction Book Club


