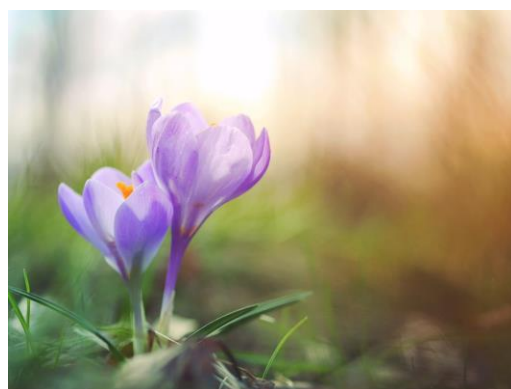

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The President's Perspective

We have the very good news to share that OCUUC has signed a ten-year lease with the Orange County Friends Meeting (Quakers) for Suites 8 and 9 commencing June 1, 2020. This wonderful news was first announced to the congregation at the February 16, 2020 Townhall meeting held after the Sunday service.

Let me give you some background on how this excellent arrangement for us and the Quakers has come to fruition.

In June of 2019 an OCUUC Property Use Group (PUG) was formed to provide strategy on the overall use of our OCUUC campus and to recommend those strategies to the Board of Trustees. Members of the PUG are Co-Chairs Tom and Nancy Loughrey, Craig and Linda Sperry, Debra Quam and Audrey Prosser, Meg Wilson, Barbara Morihiro and Geoff and Yulis Ayton.

One goal of the PUG was to find ways to build the Sanctuary and offset the loss of income during construction. As fate would have it, the Quakers contacted us looking for space to rent as their lease was expiring. This led The Property Use Group in the direction of the concept of making our entire property, including the for-profit rental building, into a "spiritual center". We have for several years now rented Suites 5 and 6A to the Christian Scientists. Now, with the addition of renting Suites 8 and 9 to the Quakers, we are well on our way to converting our campus to a spiritual center.

The Christian Scientists have always stated that their desire is to stay on the campus. The PUG has a strategy for them to stay on our campus when we come to the point of demolishing suites 3, 4 and 5 to make way for our anticipated new sanctuary building.

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The increased rental rates over current leases may mean no loss of long-term revenue even if OCUUC retains one or more of the smaller suites in the current for-profit building for our own use. This provides an option for meeting space to replace the meeting room in Suite 4. Changing to all religious uses of the rental building means we will not lose this rental revenue during construction of the new sanctuary building since the usage needs of those tenants will be evenings and weekends. Additionally, there will be a savings on our property taxes since we will be converting all of our property to non-profit usage. Many, many thanks to the members of PUG for their work on this project! A significant amount of time, talent and effort has been devoted to making this happen.

The Quakers are a wonderful group of people and they are as thrilled as we are about them joining us on our campus.

Sian's Shenanigans

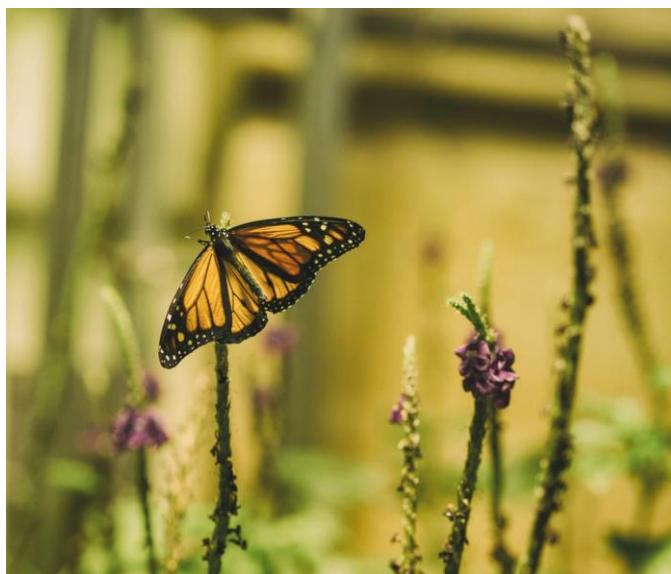

I served as Minister -in-Residence at Elementary/Family Winter Camp at de Benneville Pines over Presidents' Day weekend. Did you know that there were more opportunities to get up to camp as a family in addition to our October weekend? Children in grades 2 through 6 can come up as independent campers—and we had one from our congregation, Elise Kaufel. I took my great nephew and niece, Rowan and Leyla. One extended family came up with grandparents, parents and children for a total of 13 family members!

We had lots of fun at fort play, capture the flag, silly dancing, crafts, a little bit of sledding and a variety show. Kids had some quiet time in their cabins with terrific counselors. The weather was so warm that we were able to hold worship outside. Children have precious time in nature, learn to be in community, independence and UU values. Here are some summer Camp de Benneville opportunities: Elementary July 5-7, Junior High July 12-18, Senior High July 19-25, and Family July 26-August 1. Registration for these camps opens on March 1 and most of them fill up, Senior High especially fast. Go to uucamp.org/camp-calendar/ Scholarships are available.

At camp and in other places of nature and quiet we and our children can develop our inner lives. We can reduce distractions that keep us unconscious. When children and youth have time for their spirits it can reduce anxiety, they can develop an inner compass that helps them make healthy, life-affirming decisions and live life more closely aligned with their values. Children and youth can develop their intuition and self-worth. Seeing their own worth, our children and youth can affirm the inherent worthiness of others.

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Awakening and wisdom are our themes this month. It feels like the Earth has already begun that process. I see trees and bushes in bloom. They aren't waiting until Spring officially arrives. To live the spiritual life is to awaken. The story goes that soon after his enlightenment the Buddha passed a man on the road who was struck by the Buddha's extraordinary radiance and peaceful presence. The man stopped and asked, "My friend, what are you? Are you a celestial being or a god?" "No." said the Buddha "Well, then, are you some kind of magician or wizard?" Again the Buddha answered, "No." "Are you a man?" "No." "Well, my friend, then what are you?" The Buddha replied, "I am awake."

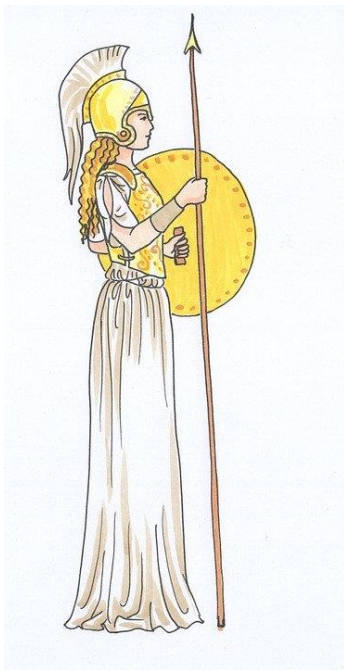


Intern's Corner

When I was a teenager, I started to read the myths of Ancient Greece, and pretty soon I stumbled over a detail that irked me so much that I closed the book, threw it under my bed, and instead did whatever teenagers do when they feel irked by the myths of the Ancient Greeks.

You may wonder what it was that caused the offense – because isn't there so much in these stories that is offensive to our modern minds? Was it one the acts of betrayal, gratuitous violence, incest, trickery? Nope, nope, and nope. What irked me to the point that I lost all interest was that Athena was the goddess of both warfare *and* wisdom.



To my teenage mind – full of ideals about peace and pacifism and goodwill, it felt like wisdom would be to just have no wars at all, period. Having the goddess of wisdom be simultaneously the goddess of warfare simply rendered her a goddess-shaped Napoleon, and I wasn't a big fan of him, either. And therefore, I felt justified in disregarding the ancient Greeks altogether and entertaining myself otherwise.

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Now, given that my book about Greek myth landed under my bed, I don't know enough about the topic to really understand why the Greeks made this designation of combining warfare and wisdom in one female (!) goddess. I feel like there's a lot to unpack there, and if one of you knows, please find me at coffee hour and tell me all about it.

But I've been thinking, in these times that are ever-more polarized, and where so much is at stake, if maybe there isn't something here that I missed. Because while getting into conflicts for the mere sake of it is certainly not an act of wisdom, neither is being conflict-avoidant. There are certain conflicts that need to be had, and others that need to not be had, and wisdom lies in knowing which battle to pick while keeping our integrity and our sanity. Reinhold Niebuhr best summed this up in his Serenity Prayer, of which the first few lines are probably familiar to you:

*"God grant me the serenity to
accept the things I cannot
change;*

*courage to change the things I
can;*

*and wisdom to know the
difference."*

I've heard these lines so often that I don't actually really *hear* them anymore, unless I really listen. And yet, in these times when so much is at stake, and conflict surrounds us wherever we turn, I do wish for serenity, courage, and wisdom – for myself, and for all of you.

OCUUC and Coronavirus

Over the last week, federal health officials have advised hospitals, schools, churches and other public facilities to begin making preparations for the possible spread of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) in the United States. We are working behind the scenes to take increased community health protection steps, as well as planning for ways we can continue our ministry together even as circumstances change.

Hoag Health Ministries has put out information for how we can protect ourselves and one another:

- Wash your hands fully and frequently.
- Keep your hands off your face, particularly your mouth, nose and eyes.
- Get a flu shot.
- Disinfect your cell phone and the surfaces in your home and workplace regularly.
- If you are feeling sick, don't go to work, school, church or any public gathering.

Because the coronavirus, like the flu, is spread from close, person-to-person contact, as well as from contact with contaminated surfaces and objects, we are taking extra steps to make sure our facilities are as safe as possible, including making hand sanitizer and disinfectant wipes available.

Most who get the corona virus just have a cold or flu symptoms and get over it as they would any cold or flu. But for those that have already compromised respiratory issues, it can be serious, even fatal. So it's important that we don't spread any other cold or flus around. If you are getting over a cold or flu and have a cough, please stay at home. Most of our services are available via livestream on Facebook (thank you, Tom Loughrey and Sarah Hunter!), so you don't have to miss out.

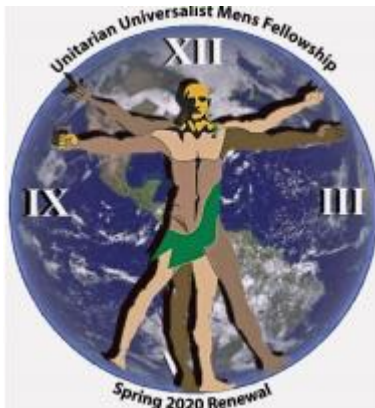
