#### Music Notes

Zooming our worship services has definitely been a challenge, but there are some really positive things that have benefitted the Music Ministries because of the need to Zoom.

- Several of us have learned (or refined our use of) audio and video editing software. The only way to create ensemble music right now is to compile individual videos together, because Internet latency is too long and too inconsistent to be able to sing or play together live, even (or actually, especially) on Zoom. So we are each singing or playing in our own houses and then sending solo recordings in to the editor, who then syncs them up and blends the sounds together. Steve Morihiro. Andres Trivino, Susan Shaw, and I are sharing the editing duties currently. It is time consuming, but for people who like solitary detail work, it's quite creative and fun.
- Because we have to submit solo videos, our singers and musicians are refining their skills. The act of listening back to oneself makes one very aware of little foibles and inconsistencies in tone, pitch, and timing. So we're all cleaning up our act as a natural result of listening back to ourselves so frequently. I have noticed lots of growth in all the choir singers, after only (only?) 3 months operating this way.
- Several of you have requested that we create a place where you can listen to our music videos and special video compilations (like the Flower Communion) again. Now we have an OCUUC Music Videos playlist on the church's YouTube channel! It's a nice repository of all the musicians' efforts. Because we have to use mostly recorded music for worship, a YouTube library of our Sunday morning

video offerings is a nice bonus. Make sure to Subscribe to the church's YouTube channel to get notified of new videos that have been uploaded.



- Everyone has had to become more creative and adventurous. Several people have written new songs, with more on the way. Small groups have gathered together to collaborate on songs. Many of you have contributed photos and videos for song montages. And many of you in the congregation have submitted your own recordings for projects like Flower Communion and the Singing Bowl video at the beginning of every service. And we now have a file full of Artists UUnite pieces to use in our slideshows and videos. Even your Minister recorded herself singing -yes, singing! -- for Rica's sendoff, "So Long, Farewell!"
- The choir is trying out Open Source software that provides a way to hear each other singing or playing together, and it syncs the sounds up in real time (or 40 miliseconds late, which is almost real time).
   Steve Morihiro has spent a great deal of

time, helping each choir member get on board individually. It's still a work in progress, but we are hopeful we will be able to sing together -- and hear each other singing together -- again soon. A quartet was able to sing a song together last week, and surprisingly, we were joined by a bass player from who-knows-where, who jumped into our decidedly not-private rehearsal "room." He was great, improvising along with us, creating a collaboration on the spot.

If you'd like to join in the fun, the choir is continuing to rehearse on Thursday nights through the summer (except we're off on July 23). It's a wonderful social network along with a laboratory for tightening up our music skills. Or if you'd like to do any solo work anytime, just let me know.

#### **New Sanctuary Capital Campaign Relaunch**

New capital campaign pledges and contributions to satisfy pledges made in the capital campaign's first phase continue to be received from generous OCUUC congregants. To date the amount pledged is \$ 589,720, with \$442,351 received (75%).

On May 12, the campaign received a major boost when the board of the San Diego-based Spirit Level Foundation sent word that they had decided to fund OCUUC's multi-year phased grant for the new sanctuary at \$50,000 per year over a five year period for a total of \$250,000, the sum requested in OCUUC's grant application. The Foundation cited OCUUC's successful fundraising efforts to date as one of the deciding factors on awarding the generous amount.


A presentation of the relaunch plan was made to the annual meeting on June 14. Following the presentation, there has been outreach to 11 "Campaign Leaders" who earlier volunteered to undergo training to seek donations in the previous combined campaign. The Campaign Leaders who will be reaching out to congregants for the capital campaign in July are Meg Wilson, Tom Loughrey, Craig Spery, Nancy Loughrey, Karen Kennedy, Sarah Hunter, Marcia Hackett, Sunny Harper, Nina Smith, Don Martin and Linda Spery.

The Campaign Leaders are committed to undergo small group Zoom training and thereafter to do individual outreach to an assigned group of congregants to seek new

capital campaign pledges and increases from existing pledges to move the campaign toward conclusion. The first phase of outreach to major gift (\$10,000+) donor prospects (existing and new pledgers) commenced in late June with Tom Loughrey and Linda Spery as campaign leaders for this first phase. We hope that everyone will be open to contacts by the Campaign Leaders who are dedicated to this campaign and volunteering their time to this important project.

Our Sunday morning camp will cover self-identity, difference, the historical and recent background of racism and resistance movements that fought and continue to work to dismantle oppression.

What would camp be without arts and crafts? Decorate your own tee shirt, assemble your own identity mosaic, make your own Femo beads and embellish your own star fish. Sounds like fun. We make it easy by assembling the supplies. All you have to do is register for Chalice Camp—it's free—and come to church on July 12 to pick up your supplies. I will ship or drop them to your home if you can't make it on Sunday, July 12.

As you can imagine the materials take time and money to assemble so we *really* do need you to register. That way we will know how many to make. It's simple: Each child's name, age, address, grade in Fall of 2020, your cell phone & email and each child's T-shirt size 6-8, 10-12, 14-16. It is heartbreaking to know that children as young as two and three years-old begin to understand that being white and having blue eyes is preferential. Whether white or a person of color we need to resist this powerful message from our culture and replace it with an even stronger narrative in the inherent worth and dignity of all people.
